


INSIGHT



OUR YOUTH MINISTRY

Most of you will be familiar with our main Sunday youth groups, T3 and MYF. Whilst we do offer other groups and socials midweek for our young people, our primary focus in the Youth Ministry at MPC is on these two weekly groups – and I wanted to just update you on what we've been up to through this last term! T3 is for 11-14s on Sunday mornings, MYF is for 14-18s on Sunday evenings. Most of the time T3 and MYF don't follow the same session plans, however this last term, we felt that both of our groups would benefit greatly from an overview of the Bible. So often when we read the Word, we fail to understand how it fits into the bigger picture of God's plans; an overview of the whole of scripture helps us with this problem.

To help us visualise as we go along, we drew a big map of the ancient near east (where the Bible takes place) on the youth room blackboard and we plot the Bible story on the map as we go through. We also gave the young people Bible timelines to help them see how it fits together chronologically. Here's roughly what we've covered in our sessions:

We began our journey, as one does, in Genesis 1 with the creation of everything. The universe is incredible, and the young people made their favourite things in creation out of modelling clay. And we, amongst all the other incredible things and creatures, are the ones made in God's image. However – we all know how the story continues – the fall of humanity in Adam and Eve happens and the state of humans just gets worse and worse. It gets so bad that God has to send a big flood to wipe people out!

Then a guy called Abraham comes onto the scene, and despite him and his wife Sarah's old age, God promises that his descendants would be as many as the stars in the sky – so we made a massive painting with the relevant verse 'Genesis 15:5' and a starry scene in the background, with mini canvases spelling 'promise.' Abraham does get a son in the end, Isaac, who has Jacob, who has Joseph, and Joseph is sold into slavery in Egypt . But God uses him in a mighty way, and he rises to power and saves Egypt and surrounding nations from famine. But the Israelites end up enslaved by Egypt for 400 years... Fortunately, 1 Moses and 10 plagues later, they're free!

Then they wander in the desert, complaining the entire time, God gives them the 10 commandments, the sacrificial law and the other laws before Joshua conquers the promised land Last week (at the time I'm writing this article) we looked at the Judges and Kings, and the cycles of sin the Israelites found themselves in – with God's love and broken heart for them expressed in Hosea 11.

We're looking forward to covering the exile, prophets, psalms and then getting into the New Testament in the new year! What we have found is that the entire Bible points toward Jesus; right from the beginning in Genesis 3:15, through Abraham's near sacrifice of Isaac, the Passover, the sacrificial law, and much more. And, like the Israelites, trapped in cycles of sin and rebellion needed a Saviour, so do we need Him.

MY TESTIMONY by PAT GRIFFITHS 💈

Growing up, I considered myself a Christian, living in a bush town in South Australia. The churches were the centre of social life in the town. Life was very relaxed and happy. I attended Sunday School, Church and choir and young people's youth activities. All separate from my family, just something I wanted to do. I started Nursing.

I moved to England with my family in the late 1960's. Life then changed completely as, instead of returning to Australia as I had planned, I met my husband and happily started a family and career here. Religion continued to play more of a background part of life then.

I have had an eventful and wonderful life with fabulous family and friends. I thought life couldn't be better.....

In early 2022 my world imploded through the unexpected passing of my husband. I kept busy sorting out as much as I could with lots of support from my family and friends. I was managing to exist by moving from task to task but inside I felt completely empty. One night I found myself absolutely bereft and couldn't find the means to comfort myself. I asked that question - "Why?" I became aware of a warming calmness that I could feel moving down on me and I heard the words, "I am here".... and after a pause, "Find me." I didn't question it until the next day as I had fallen asleep and did feel better. I didn't really understand what had happened but within a couple of days a nephew, who is a committed Christian somehow knew I was struggling and came and gave me a small book of the Gospel of John and two small crosses. He said to read the Gospel and that I would find great comfort. I did this and it switched on a little light in me. I began to feel much better emotionally and spiritually, but what next?

My husband and I had been about to start a Bible Study class before he became ill. I contacted Moulton church and asked about the Ladies Bible Study group. It was a group that I was warmly welcomed into and it fired an interest in the Bible that I had not had the chance to explore in detail earlier in my life. The knowledge and companionship has proven to be a great joy. I was also offered the chance to attend the latest Alpha Group, which is an exploratory weekly study group looking at an introduction to Christianity.

This added to my direction with easy and clear explanation of basic Christian beliefs and true faith. This also led on to the 321 sessions which were also very interesting.

I felt more confident about my future and have felt that God has followed my progress. It has also allowed me to research into the truth of the Bible which has been a great comfort for me.

I wanted to cement my faith and membership into the Christian and Church family, so asked if it would be possible to be confirmed. I attended confirmation classes followed by my recent confirmation. It was a wonderful ceremony with adult baptisms as well.

My self confidence has improved greatly since the early days of the Ladies Bible Study group and also in life. I have accepted Jesus Christ as my Lord and Saviour and couldn't be happier. I feel I have been guided here

FAVOURITE CAROLS - O COME ALL YE FAITHFUL



This rousing carol often ends Christmas carol services The title draws us into the Christmas story in Luke 2:8-16 where angels appear to shepherds glorifying God because of the birth of the baby Jesus, our Saviour, who lies in a manger in Bethlehem.

This hymn is also known as "Adeste Fidelis" and is sung in Latin at the Vatican each Christmas.

John Francis Wade is now widely recognised as the author and composer of this hymn, although at one time it was believed the text was written by Cisctercian monks. Wade was born in 1711 in England. However, he was a Roman Catholic who had to flee to France in 1745 after the failed Jacobite Rebellion, leading to discrimination against Catholics He lived in exile in Douai in northern France teaching music at an English college. He also supplemented his income by hand copying chant music which he then sold to wealthy families for use in their chapels. His calligraphy was so beautiful that the copies were in great demand and he would sign each one. Wade died in Douai in 1786.

The earliest manuscript of Adeste Fidelis which was written in Latin in 4 stanzas or verses and signed by Wade is dated around 1743. There is a printed version in a book published by Wade dating to 1751 and held by Stonyhurst College in Lancashire. Within 50 years four additional stanzas also in Latin had been added - three by the French Catholic priest Jean-Francois-Etienne Borderies and a fourth anonymous verse which is rarely printed.



The carol was translated into English in 1841 by Frederick Oakeley, born on the 5th September 1802 in Shrewsbury. After graduating w.ith an MA from Christ Church, Oxford he took orders in the Church of Englan. However, Oakeley was active in the ""Oxford Movement" (which sought a renewal of Catholic thought and practice within the Church of England, rather than its Protestant tendencies) and he was consequently suspended. He, therefore, resigned his position in the Church of England and joined the Church of Rome, becoming a Priest and Canon in the diocese of Westminster. He originally titled the carol 'Ye Faithful, Approach Ye' before it was altered to its current form. Oakley died on 29 January 1880.

O Come All Ye Faithful is the penultimate carol sung at the Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols, sung by the choir at Kings College, Cambridge - usually followed by Hark! The Herald Angels Sing!.

The second verse of the carol draws heavily upon the Nicene Creed - True God of true God

Light from light eternal....

So singing this verse establishes a link that goes back to 325AD at the Council of Nicea.

Today the carol celebrates our coming together in worship to adore the loving blessing of Jesus as He sacrificed Himself for our salvation, GINA GRAY



THE FESTIVAL OF NINE LESSONS & CAROLS

We all like Christmas carols, don't we? - however often we have heard them I certainly do. The pinnacle of carol-singing to my mind is that of King's College Chapel, Cambridge in the annual Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols I once went to an Advent Carol Service there whilst I was up at Cambridge, but I have never been to the Festival, which takes place during the University's Christmas vacation. However, it is broadcast by the BBC, on radio since 1928 and on television since 1954. I try to watch it if I can.

King's College was founded by King Henry VI in 1441, but the Chapel's construction was not finished until about seventy years later. The building, both the exterior and the interior, is as glorious as the singing within. The view of the Chapel and the Gibb's Building alongside it, when seen from across the River Cam, is the most picturesque and, I guess, the most often photographed in England.

The Festival was the idea of Eric Milner-White. He had been an undergraduate of the College before the First World War and, after a distinguished career during the War, returned as Dean in 1918, the year the Festivval was first held. It was not an entirely original concept, something similar had been tried in the new Diocese of Truro in 1880.

The music for the Festival includes all the traditional carols, plus some resurrected for the occasion from Mediaeval sources and others written or arranged by composers of the present day, such as John Rutter. The Service intersperses these carols with nine readings from the Bible (the Lessons). The readers range from a choir-boy to the Provost (Head)of King's College. The adult members of the Choir are all Choral Scholars of the College, the boys, when they are not involved in Chapel Services, live and work at the Choir School, studying the usual school subjects as well as music.

Since the inception of the Festival there have been six Directors of Music at King's - A H Mann, Boris Ord, David Willcocks, Philip Ledger and till his death in 2019 Stephen Cleobury. Today the Choir is directed by Daniel Hyde.

They train the boys as well as attending rehearsals and directing the singing in each Service. The College appoints a separate, usually undergraduate, Organ Scholar to accompany the singing and to play the organ voluntaries and other solos at the beginning and end of the Festival and each other Service.

Many cathedrals and parish churches have copied King's College in putting on similar Christmas Carol Services. Moulton Parish Church has (or used to have) its "Carols by Candlelight" though there are usually only six or seven readings instead of the traditional nine. The last reading is always from the first chapter of John's Gospel, "In the beginning was the Word...." (John 1:1-14). Years ago, when I was a Churchwarden, it used to be my privilege to read this passage.

I have an older brother Steve, who has now moved to Lincoln, his partner's name is Ann-Marie. I married Jan in 1992 in a little chapel in the High Street, Irchester. Great day!

My job: I was a printer for 3 years and then I was a musician. We won a Battle of the Bands Competition in Leicester and from there we won a 3 month contract in the Canary Islands. I loved those years in the band but we split up just before I had my brain injury.

Jonny was speaking and we were blown away by what he was teaching. It felt like we were both being washed with water. This was just before Covid and lockdown, but we're still here, made of hard stuff!

Currently reading: Due to my constant double vision, I don't read
